Dear Parents/Guardians and Students:

Welcome to Lebanon High School and Honors English 9! The LHS English Department requires summer reading for all college-level students. One goal of our program is for students to read a variety of literary genres throughout the year. This summer, Honors English 9 students will read a memoir OR an autobiography. Memoirs focus on a specific time or event in an author's life, while autobiographies tackle the entire scope of an author's life from the author's own perspective.

Tips for selecting a book for this assignment (Amazon Books and Goodreads are great sites to start a search):

- Read a summary
- Read a sample chapter
- Research reader reviews
- Ask family and friends for recommendations
- Explore the list of attached titles I've provided

The memoir OR autobiography should be:

- At least 200 pages in length
- Appropriate for a high school reading level
- Something the student has not read

Included is a list of *suggested* titles, but students are not limited to these. The selections on the list are for mature reading audiences (high school, college, and adult); these texts may contain explicit language, violence, and/or sexual situations. Parents/guardians are strongly encouraged to be involved in the selection and reading process. These recommendations come from the Indiana Department of Education, College Board, and LHS teachers and students.

Students are responsible for obtaining a copy of their selection. Selections can be in print or digital form. Students can borrow from the library, purchase from an online bookstore, or borrow from a family member or friend. Students may also listen to an audiobook if that is their preference.

It is imperative that students complete their reading *before* the first day of class. During the first weeks of the semester, students will need access to the text in order to complete a variety of assignments beginning on the first day of class. I am not assigning students to take structured notes, but it would be helpful for them to keep a list of characters with descriptions, details about setting, conflict, and themes, and summaries of important plot points.

I will check my email weekly, so you may not receive an immediate response. Please don't wait until the last minute to begin your project.
